I. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

In the geopolitical scene, the year 2010 saw the continued devastation and deaths of innocent lives due to acts of terrorism. From suicide bombers, parcel bombs to attempted blowing up of an airplane, terrorist groups continue to rain fear in the world. Despite increased security hardening measures, improved airport security, increased vigilance by enforcement agencies and sharing of vital security information, terrorist groups have become more brazen in their attacks and continue to target innocent civilians in their pursuit of 'social justice', 'religious self righteousness' and 'blind patriotism'. From Afghanistan to the continent of Africa, many have perished in the hands of terrorist groups in the name of 'freedom', 'religion' and skewed ideological beliefs.

Unfortunately, these acts would continue due to perceived injustices and continued aggression of the powerful over the weak. On our part, we have to equip ourselves with the relevant tools and information to

counter these ideologies and attacks at the embryonic stage if possible, if not, then before it occurs or reaches our soil.

To this end, SEARCCT had taken several measures to ensure that the programmes and research work conducted by the Centre catered to the needs and wants of its clients and addressed present and future threats of terrorism.



This Annual Report will also provide its clients with a 'report card' of the activities conducted throughout 2010, and the introduction of two new flagships in 2010 i.e. Youth and Terrorism; and Terrorism Financing. The inclusion of these additional topics

are due to its increasing 'popularity' as a potential terrorist threat and its influence on youths, who are used as conduits to further the goals and objectives of terrorist groups.

Though projects with regional and international organisations would only take effect in 2011, the groundwork for these contacts was laid in 2010. In terms of expanding SEARCCT's network of collaborators, the Centre was able to secure funding from the Japan-ASEAN Integration Fund (JAIF) to conduct research and training activities for Youth and Terrorism for 2011. Contact was also established with the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC) in Bangkok to conduct capacity building programmes for 2011.



On the research front, round table talks, public awareness programmes and Friday Morning Sessions at the Foreign Ministry were conducted to reach out to as many individuals and organisations as possible in SEARCCT's public awareness programmes. Contribution of articles to foreign publications was increased and the second volume of SEARCCT's Selection of Articles, was printed.

This Annual Report will provide a summary of the core activities conducted by the Planning and Training Division and the Research and Publication Division of SEARCCT. Nonetheless, a summary of the activities conducted by the other divisions at SEARCCT i.e. Administration and Finance Division is included to provide an overall view of SEARCCT's workings for 2010.

Planning and Training

II. PLANNING AND TRAINING DIVISION

Programmes organised by this Division contribute mainly to the Centre's overall performance, as more than 60% of SEARCCT's activities are related to capacity building programmes. In 2010, a total of 11 training programmes were organised. **(Annex A – Planning and Training Division: Programmes for 2010)**. Though this figure is lesser than 2009, there were three pilot projects held, namely Emergency Management Exercise Design (EMED) in collaboration with the United States of America (US); Terrorism Financing with Australia; and Chemical and Explosive System Exploitation (CESE) with Canada.



There was also an increase in the number of foreign participants i.e. from 69 in 2009 to 86 in 2010, bringing the total number of participants who have attended SEARCCT's programs since 2003 to 2650 participants. **(Annex B - Participants)**. All training programmes conducted were held within Kuala Lumpur.

- Joint Cooperation and Collaborators

2. Out of the total 11 programmes conducted in 2010, 30% were conducted with local collaborators while 70% were conducted with foreign collaborators. Local collaborators included the Prison Department, Attorney-General's (AG's) Chamber, Chemistry Department, Royal Malaysia Police (RMP), Malaysian Armed Forces and the Financial Intelligence Unit (FIU) from the Central Bank of Malaysia. As for foreign collaboration, the US engaged and jointly conducted a pilot programme with SEARCCT after a lapse of two

years. Apart from that, Australia and Canada, SEARCCT's traditional collaborators, embarked on two pilot projects related to Terrorism Financing and CESE. The other collaborators included Australia, Britain, France and New Zealand.



3. Cooperation with local and foreign collaborators included assistance in the form of cost sharing, selection of experts, structuring training programmes and identifying speakers for Round Table talks. However, due to domestic financial limitations, a few foreign collaborators could not extend similar assistance as in previous years. There were also several High Commissions and Embassies such as India, European Union and Pakistan which showed interest in wanting to initiate some

form of cooperation with SEARCCT in 2011.

- Evaluation of Programmes

4. To ensure the effectiveness of the programmes conducted and the administration services provided, participants were asked for their comments and evaluation on the last day of the respective courses. For SEARCCT, any grading of five and above is regarded as an indication that the objectives of the said programme have been achieved and the contrary, if the grade is below five. For programmes held in 2010, participants gave the grading of five and above in almost all the areas evaluated (80% of the programmes). However, the common thread of complaint was that the courses held were too short and more information was needed on the basics of terrorism i.e. the root causes, its history and current and horizon threats. These grouses will be addressed with the introduction of a new programme in 2011 entitled Terrorism 101.

5. With regard to the length of a course, on average, courses are held for three (3) to five (5) days. To stretch the course any longer would incur higher cost, and this could be an obstacle to the collaborators and to SEARCCT.

- Budget

6. Except for public lectures held at the Institute of Diplomacy and Foreign Relations (IDFR), all other programmes were conducted at local hotels (ranging from 3 to 4 stars). Nevertheless, several cost-saving measures were taken. Lower end hotels (3 stars) were used to conduct some programmes, particularly those totally financed by SEARCCT and which catered to local participants.



7. The total training expenditure for 11 programmes in 2010 amounted to RM177,773.50 against the budgeted allocation of RM178,190.81. All this was done without the need to reduce neither the number of programmes planned nor compromise on the quality of the training programmes.

- Speakers / Trainers

8. As SEARCCT has limited in-house training facilities and expertise available, it relied very much on external human training resources, i.e., for both local and foreign trainers and speakers. Foreign experts and trainers were sourced by foreign collaborators, while local experts were identified by SEARCCT from local agencies such as the police force, customs and immigration and from SEARCCT's own Research Division. Others such as the AG's Chambers, Malaysian Armed Forces (MAF), Malaysian Maritime Enforcement Agency (MMEA), Malaysian Medical Services, and institutions such as Institut Latihan Islam Malaysia (ILIM), Institut Kefahaman Islam Malaysia (IKIM) and Institut Latihan Kehakiman dan

Perundangan (ILKAP), extended the assistance of experts and speakers when requested.



9. In collaboration with the Canadian Government, SEARCCT was able to facilitate and develop the transfer of knowledge from Canadian trainers in Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear and Explosives (CBRNE) incidents to a pool of local trainers, namely from the Fire and Rescue Department, Atomic Energy Licensing Board, Nuclear Biological Chemical Warfare Centre of the Malaysian Armed Forces, Chemistry Department and Malaysian Medical Services.



10. SEARCCT is also in the process of engaging the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade of Australia in a similar exchange programme related to counter-terrorism (this is after SEARCCT conducted the *Countering the Financing of Terrorism Seminar and Exercise* with Australia from 2 to 3 November 2010).

11. However, in wanting to ensure that all SEARCCT's officers are well-versed with the subject matter, SEARCCT is taking the initiative to train officers in the Centre to conduct

talks and seminars on subjects related to their respective Divisions.

- Preparation of Courses / Programmes

12. In planning the annual training programmes for the coming year, discussions with local government agencies that form SEARCCT's clientele are usually held in the 3rd or 4th quarter of the year. For 2010, the meeting with local collaborators was held on 26 August 2010 while the meeting with foreign collaborators was held on 5 September 2010. The main objective of these meetings was to assist SEARCCT in identifying the clients' needs, seek new partners for collaboration and review existing programmes. Feedbacks received would enable SEARCCT to craft better programmes for the coming year. **(Annex C – Planning and Training Division: Programmes for 2011).**

- Proposed Capacity Building Programmes for 2011

13. Since two new flagships i.e. Youth and Terrorism and Terrorism

Financing have been identified for 2011, capacity building programmes will now include these two new subjects. SEARCCT will also accelerate its cooperation with both regional and international organisations to conduct joint capacity building programmes for 2011.



14. It is also SEARCCT's objective to conduct on its own, 4 in-house training programmes, apart from the ones conducted with foreign collaborators. Topics for these in-house programmes will concentrate on Youth and Terrorism, CBRNE, Terrorism 101 and Cyber Terrorism.



Research and Publication

III. RESEARCH AND PUBLICATION DIVISION

Activities within the ambit of this Division include carrying out research work, publication, organising round table talks and public awareness programmes, giving lectures and contributing articles to local and foreign security journals on counter terrorism.

2. For 2010, 16 Round Table and Public Talks were conducted, on topics ranging from Terrorism: Past, Present and Future to the Hizbut Tahrir Movement in Malaysia. Speakers for the talks comprised of officials from local enforcement agencies and foreign experts on counter terrorism issues, one of whom was the first counter terrorism judge in the world – Jean Louise Brugguirre. **(Annex D – Research and Publication Division: Programmes for 2010).**

3. With regard to research work, several new topics were explored and introduced in 2010, among them Cyber Terrorism, *Jemaah Islamiyah* in Malaysia, and Youth and Terrorism.

However, though preliminary research has begun, these research works will only be completed in 2011, due to the extensive nature of the subject matter.



4. Several publications were also released while a few articles were written by SEARCCT's Research Officers (RO) and printed in local and international journals such as *'Developments and Issues in Terrorism in the Region'* in the Gateway Bulletin published by the Ministry of Information Communication and Culture in February 2010, and *'The Lure of Youth into Terrorism'* published in December 2010 in the SEARCCT's Selection of Articles 2011. **(Annex E – Publications).**

5. SEARCCT's Research Officers also gave several lectures to both local

and foreign participants on Malaysia's experience in handling issues related to Counter- Terrorism (**Annex F – Lecture Topics**).



6. The participation of members of the media also saw the outcome on SEARCCT's Round Table Talks being reported in local newspapers and the electronic media (New Straits Times, The Star, Utusan Malaysia and Bernama online). Furthermore, due to the composition of the participants, which ranged from members of the diplomatic corps, academicians, post graduate students to members of the media, these Round Table talks ignited very encouraging response from the audience during the Question and Answer sessions with participants voicing their opinions and views without fear or favour, creating a

conducive environment for thought provoking ideas and comments.

- Cooperation / Collaboration

7. For 2010, the Division established a working relationship with several Embassies and local government agencies when preparing its research programmes and Round Table Talks. Among them were the Embassy of France, the European Union (EU) Delegation Office and the Royal Malaysia Police. The Division also has a close working relationship with several local public universities and think-tanks such as Universiti Teknologi MARA (UiTM), Universiti Kebangsaan Malaysia (UKM), Universiti Utara Malaysia (UUM), Universiti Malaya (UM), Public Service Department of Malaysia (INTAN) and Institute of Strategic and International Studies (ISIS) Malaysia, especially in its public awareness programmes.

8. Apart from establishing networking within the country, the Research Division, along with the Director-General, were also responsible and involved in presenting

Papers at international and regional conferences such as 'Youth and Terrorism' for the 10th Council for Asian Transnational Threat Research (CATR) in Manila, Philippines (October 2010). Topics of presentation included Malaysia's Experience in Handling Terrorism Threats and Youth and Terrorism. It was during one of such conferences and presentation of Paper that SEARCCT successfully obtained a grant totalling USD 103,735.50 to conduct a joint research and training programme under the Japan-ASEAN Integration Fund on Youth and Terrorism.

9. This is a first for SEARCCT. This research project would involve field work in selected ASEAN countries to study the methodology employed by terrorist organisations in the ASEAN region in attracting, radicalising and subsequently recruiting youths and to also evaluate current measures being undertaken by ASEAN member states in dealing with this issue.

10. There were also several visits from military colleges in India, Pakistan and Sri Lanka. Apart from being

briefed on the activities of the Centre and the initiatives taken by the Malaysian government in combating terrorism, representatives from the Special Branch of RMP were also present to provide participants with the latest up-dates on threats of terrorism in the country and the region as well as to answer questions which could be deemed as 'sensitive'.



- Budget

11. For 2010, RM 63,046.86 was allocated to conduct research and publication work. A large portion of the amount was utilised for round table discussions, the purchase of resources for research work such as books and journals, the payment for contributors of journal articles as well as the editing of journals, organising round table discussions and the payment of

honorarium for speakers. Though the amount was sufficient to conduct all the programmes held in 2010, the same amount would not suffice for 2011, as compared to the previous years; there will be several additional research works to be conducted in 2011.

Proposed Programmes for 2011

1. Research Activities

- Youth and terrorism
- Cyber terrorism
- Internet radicalisation
- *Jemaah Islamiyah*
- Rehabilitation and deradicalisation programmes
- Border security and terrorism

2. Non-research based programmes

➤ Terrorism 101

- A two-day structured course catered for government agencies that cover the basics of terrorism and counter-terrorism.

- Topics would include history of terrorism, nature of terrorism, counter-terrorism strategies, root causes of terrorism, cyber terrorism and case studies of terrorist groups.

➤ 'Looking Back' Series

- A series of six (6) lectures that traces the communist insurgency from its inception, the strategies employed by the Communist Party of Malaya (CPM), the strategies employed by the authorities, the Psy-Ops War and the Haadyai Talks that led to the closure of the communist threat in Malaysia.
- The lectures will be delivered by retired and serving senior police, military and diplomatic officers and will target government officials, university students, foreign diplomats and the academia.

➤ Round Table Talks

- Closed-door sessions by experts in the field of counter-terrorism targeting selected organisations.

➤ **Friday Morning Sessions**

- Sessions on terrorism and counter-terrorism for junior officers from Wisma Putra to both educate and bring about awareness on the subject-matter.

➤ **SEARCCT – University Lecture Series**

- A series of six (6) awareness programmes conducted with Malaysian institutions of higher learning with the purpose of engaging the undergraduates to educate and to assess their perception on extremism and terrorism.

➤ **SEARCCT – *Program Latihan Khidmat Negara* (PLKN) Project**

- Designing a module on extremism for the PLKN or national service programme.

3. Publications

- Three (3) monographs on the issue of terrorism and counter-terrorism; and
- Six (6) articles on the issue of terrorism and counter-terrorism.

Administration and Finance

IV. ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCE DIVISION

- Budget

With regard to the administration and financial running of the Centre, SEARCCT utilised 95.80% (RM 3,574,251.85) of its allocated budget (RM 3,730,871.00) for 2010. This is a decrease of 1.76% from the previous year. The bulk of the budget was for salary and emolument, capacity building and training programmes, publication and research work and compulsory contractual payments. Breakdown of the allocation is as in **Annex G**.

- Organisational Structure: Manpower

2. SEARCCT has a total of 55 posts, but only 50 have been filled. Of that, two officers are on secondment from the military, one from the Police while four Research Officers are on contract. Vacant posts for 2010 included the post of one Director of Administration and Finance (M48), Administrative Assistance (N17),

Technician (F17), Head of Security (KP14) and a driver (R3). (**Annex H**).

3. The year 2010, also saw the appointment of a new Director-General of SEARCCT, Ambassador Datin Paduka Rashidah Ramli on 10 May and the appointment of a new Director for the Research and Publication Division – Mr. Thomas Koruth Samuel on 18 April 2010. Assistant Commissioner of Police (ACP) Ali Omar, the Centre's new Director of Planning and Training Division, was appointed on 20 December 2010.

4. An interview for two vacant posts for Research Officers was conducted on 3 March 2010. A total of seven (7) potential candidates were interviewed (including the ones who attended the interview in 2009). In July and August respectively, two new ROs joined SEARCCT. The inclusion of these new officers will allow the Division to conduct more research activities.

5. The post of Director and Deputy Director for the Planning and Training Division and the Director of Research

and Publication Division were also filled in 2010. At the same time, SEARCCT also saw the completion of duty of three officers from the military and police force attached on secondment to SEARCCT. One Research Officer was promoted from 41 to 44, while the post of assistant librarian was filled after a period of 6 months.

6. SEARCCT is of the strong view that officers attached to the Research and Publication Division should be employed on a permanent basis rather than a renewable two-year contract. This is to avoid the abrupt stop and disruption in research work and the need for continuity when doing a particular research topic.

7. Apart from that, it was felt that officers seconded to the Planning and Training Division be individuals with prior knowledge and experience in training to enable them to carry out capacity building programmes effectively.

8. With regard to supporting staff, SEARCCT had agreed to Wisma

Putra's urgent request in 2009 to transfer one of its drivers to Wisma Putra. However, this is on a temporary basis. 2010 also saw the retirement of two of SEARCCT's supporting staff i.e. En. Md Nor Jaafar (KP14) and En. Zamani Kassim (N17) and the transfer of En. Izwaniaimy Ibrahim (N1) to Wisma Putra. There were also several other requests from supporting staff to be transferred to Wisma Putra due to transportation woes, but these requests would only be met once their replacements have been identified by the Ministry.

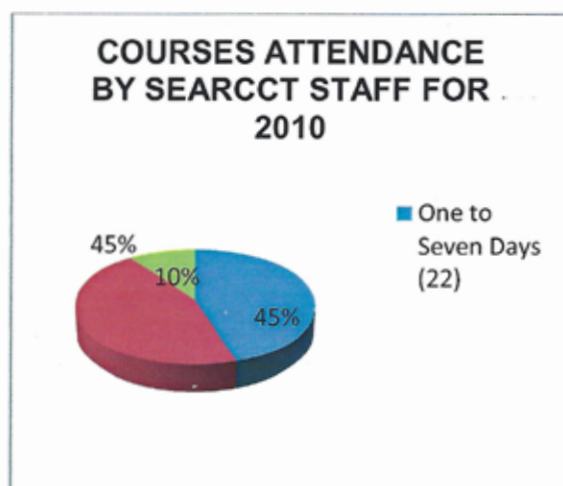
9. Further, in view of the increasing number of foreign visitors to the Centre as well as telephone enquiries from both local and foreign individuals, SEARCCT has requested the Human Resource Division of Wisma Putra to fill the existing post of a receptionist / telephonist and technician.

- Training Courses for Staff

10. Staff members are encouraged to attend courses and lectures

organised by Wisma Putra, INTAN and other government agencies.

11. To this end, for the year in review, 44 (90%) of SEARCCT's staff attended training courses / talks organised internally or overseas. Of that number, 22 (50%) attended at least a one day course while another 22 (50%) attended a maximum of 7 days. A matrix of courses attended by SEARCCT staff is submitted to the Human Resource Department of Wisma Putra monthly.



12. SEARCCT also hosted a Hari Raya Open House on 7 October 2010 which saw an estimated 150 local guests attending the function. On the sports and social front, SEARCCT organised several volleyball and badminton matches with Selayang Hospital. SEARCCT staff also

participated in Wisma Putra's sports activities.

- Security Measures, Disposal of Office Equipment and Asset Inventory

13. With regard to the security and safety of the perimeter, additional precautionary steps such as improving the lighting system, installing better card access security measures, upgrading the fire alarm system, replacing the faulty lightning prevention system, and fogging within the premise were among steps taken for the safety of its staff. SEARCCT had also written a letter to Keretapi Tanah Melayu (KTM) Berhad, the owner of the adjoining piece of land, requesting them to clear the overgrown bushes bordering the Centre and trim the branches which are overhanging into the Centre's compound.

14. SEARCCT was also provided with 36 computers to replace the old ones. The old ones were duly returned to the ICT Division, in accordance with the necessary procedures.

15. All assets including paintings were recorded and updated in MyAsset System. A copy of SEARCCT's Painting Catalogue was also submitted to the Administration Division of Wisma Putra on 4th October 2010. The total worth (estimated) of paintings in SEARCCT was valued at RM 69,700.

16. The filing system was also spruced up with several checks being conducted and details which required updating were done accordingly.

- **Loss of Items**

17. A unit of notebook computer model DELL Vostro 1320, value at RM5281.92 was reported lost. Early investigation report (KEW.PA-28) was submitted to the Administration Division, Wisma Putra on 21 October 2010.

- **Web Portal**

18. SEARCCT's Web Portal was established on 1 January 2009, and was ranked number 23 out of 1192 government agencies and Ministries

by MAMPU in the same year. In 2010, there were a total of 36,380 visits from 60 countries (as of Dec 31, 2010). Visitors were mainly from Malaysia, the United States, Australia, Indonesia and the United Kingdom.

19. Among the measures and proposals taken to increase the number of visitors to the web portal included improving its contents by uploading articles published by SEARCCT, its annual prospectus, displaying current events related to terrorism and anti-terrorism initiatives in Malaysia and displaying articles related to the fundamentals of terrorism and counter-terrorism. Participants will also now be able to register on-line for SEARCCT's courses.

V. SEARCCT'S STRATEGIC OPERATIONAL PLAN, 2011 - 2020

SEARCCT is currently in the midst of completing its Strategic Operational Plan for 2011 – 2020. The intention of the Plan is to revamp and redirect the Centre's objectives to act in tandem with Wisma Putra's as stated in the Ministry's Strategic Plan. It is also hoped that the Plan will carve a niche for SEARCCT in areas relevant and deemed important for counter-terrorism. The Strategic Operational Plan is intended to be all encompassing, ranging from establishing SEARCCT as a Centre for research and publication and capacity building programmes, strengthening manpower and number of expertise, to locating to a new premise which can house the increased number of programmes.

2. The Strategic Operational Plan will encompass the core business of SEARCCT i.e. capacity building and research, and at the same time, include improvement strategies for the effective administration of the Centre.

It also takes into consideration the two new flagships and ways to address issues related to counter-terrorism in a more wholesome manner. Among the steps suggested include broadening the scope of collaborators to include international and regional organisations such as the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) and the United Nations (UN), attract prominent speakers for the round table talks, and publish more research findings and for SEARCCT to organise, facilitate and conduct four (4) courses on its own, including one under the aegis of the Malaysian Technical Cooperation Programme (MTCP).

3. As stated in the Strategic Operational Plan, the objective is to make SEARCCT a leading Centre within the region which would act as a capacity building and research centre for counter-terrorism catering to the needs of the Malaysian Government and the Southeast Asian countries.

ORGANISATIONAL CHART (2010)

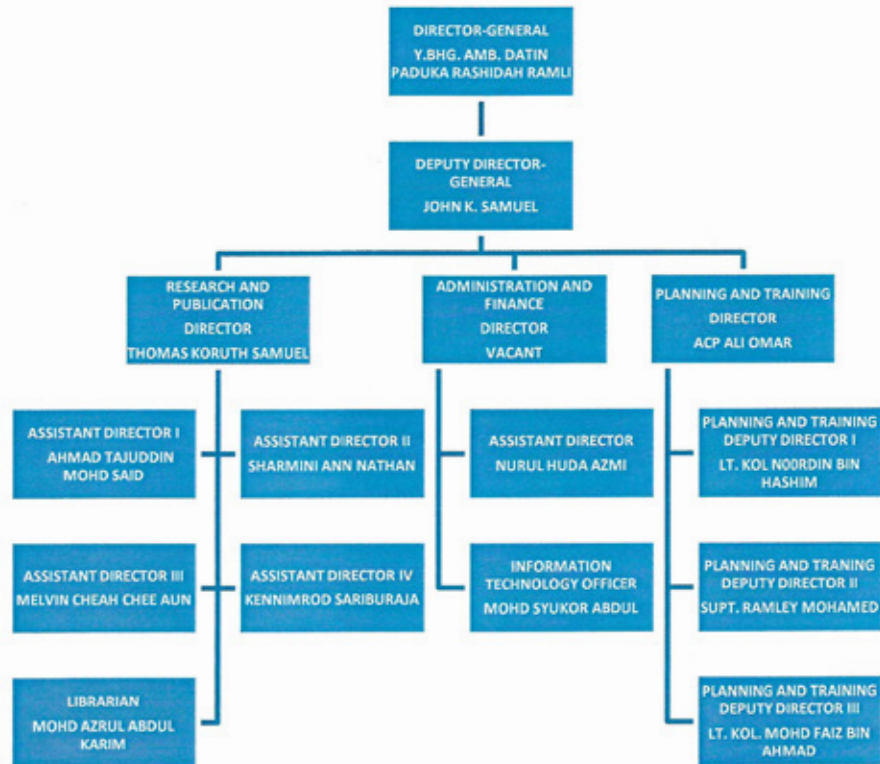


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
